THE CAMP LEJEUNE JUSTICE ACT AT A GLANCE

Veteran or

Family Member or

Civilian Worker

Do I qualify?

On base or exposed to the water at Camp Lejeune for 30 days or more between 1 January 1953 and 31 December 1987.

One or more of the following diseases:

- a. Cancers: Bladder, Kidney, Liver, Breast, Esophageal or Lung
- b. Leukemia (Adult or during childhood)
- c. Multiple Myeloma
- d. Parkinson's Disease
- e. Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma
- f. Kidney Failure, End Stage Renal Disease, Kidney Tumors
- g. Systemic Sclerosis or Scleroderma
- h. Aplastic Anemia or Myelodysplastic Syndrome
- i. Miscarriage (While stationed at the base)
- j. Fatty Liver, Hepatic Steatosis, or NASH

Compensation is available for any injured party to include those of a deceased parent or grandparent.





Lejeune Claims Q&A

1. Will this affect my VA benefits?

No. According to the Department of the Navy, "Claims filed under the Camp Lejeune Act do not impact benefits or programs administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs."

2. What can I recover?

The full value of your injury to include medical bills, lost wages, disfigurement, pain, suffering and inconvenience. Your spouse may also recovery for a loss of consortium due to your injuries. This could amount to a significant sum of tax free money.

3. If I do not get compensated, will I owe the attorneys anything?

No. The lawyers work on a contingency basis, meaning they only get paid if they make a recovery for you. Lawyers will never ask you for money. Any payment they receive will have been deducted from a settlement or payment on your behalf.

4. Is there a time limit?

There is a strict time limit that requires your claim to be filed with the Department of the Navy within two years of August 10, 2022.

5. How long will this take?

Once your claim is filed, there is a six month waiting period which is a legally required holding pattern. After the waiting period, your claim may resolve in months or years, depending on how may claims are filed.

6. What if someone is deceased? Will I have to open an estate?

You may have to open an estate, depending on your state of residence. We have personnel and resources to assist with this process.
